
HELPFUL NOTES





THE FIRST LESSON

Philippians 1:21-30

The Lector says A reading from the letter of Paul to the Philippians.

To me, living is Christ and dying is gain. If I am to live in the flesh, that means fruitful labor for me; and I do not know which I prefer. I am hard pressed between the two: my desire is to depart and be with Christ, for that is far better; but to remain in the flesh is more necessary for you. Since I am convinced of this, I know that I will remain and continue with all of you for your progress and joy in faith, so that I may share abundantly in your boasting in Christ Jesus when I come to you again.

Only, live your life in a manner worthy of the gospel of Christ, so that, whether I come and see you or am absent and hear about you, I will know that you are standing firm in one spirit, striving side by side with one mind for the faith of the gospel, and are in no way intimidated by your opponents. For them this is evidence of their destruction, but of your salvation. And this is God's doing. For he has graciously granted you the privilege not only of believing in Christ, but of suffering for him as well-- since you are having the same struggle that you saw I had and now hear that I still have.

THE SECOND LESSON

Matthew 20:1-16

The Lector says A reading from the Gospel of Matthew.

Jesus said, "The kingdom of heaven is like a landowner who went out early in the morning to hire laborers for his vineyard. After agreeing with the laborers for the usual daily wage, he sent them into his vineyard. When he went out about nine o'clock, he saw others standing idle in the marketplace; and he said to them, 'You also go into the vineyard, and I will pay you whatever is right.' So they went. When he went out again about noon and about three o'clock, he did the same. And about five o'clock he went out and found others standing around; and he said to them, Why are you standing here idle all day?' They said to him, 'Because no one has hired us.' He said to them, You also go into the vineyard.' When evening came, the owner of the vineyard said to his manager, 'Call the laborers and give them their pay, beginning with the last and then going to the first.' When those hired about five o'clock came, each of them received the usual daily wage. Now when the first came, they thought they would receive more; but each of them also received the usual daily wage. And when they received it, they grumbled against the landowner, saying, 'These last worked only one hour, and you have made them equal to us who have borne the burden of the day and the scorching heat.' But he replied to one of them, 'Friend, I am doing you no wrong; did you not agree with me for the usual daily wage? Take what belongs to you and go; I choose to give to this last the same as I give to you. Am I not allowed to do what I choose with what belongs to me? Or are you envious because I am generous?' So the last will be first, and the first will be last."

THE APOSTLES' CREED







THE CHOIR

Hannah De Priest, Anna Kain, Patty Kennedy, Erica Schuller Amber Farish, Lisa Rogers Lee, Luke Lemmeier Chuck Chandler, Charles Cooney, Jianghai Ho Ed Frazier Davis, Gabriel Reitmeier, Nick Ward **George Frideric Handel** composed the music for the oratorio *Solomon* in 1748, and it had its premiere in London in 1749. Well-established in England as a composer of opera, cultural and religious stigma against the stage gradually encouraged Handel to turn his attention to concert performances of his operas, eventually giving rise to the birth of the English oratorio. *Solomon* was one of a string of these large-scale, religious choral and orchestral works which were quite successful both during Handel's lifetime and after his death, with snippets of their music remaining in the popular canon even to the present day. "Arrival of the Queen of Sheba" is an orchestral movement from the third act of the oratorio that features sparkling dialogues between the *tutti* and solo voices.

Sir Charles Villiers Stanford (1852-1924), born in Dublin, Organist-Choirmaster of and Professor at Trinity College, Cambridge, was responsible for training most of last century's greatest English composers. He was a prolific composer composing several settings of the canticles for the Morning and Evening Services, as well as many choral anthems. The Service in B Flat Major is a joyous and gracious collection. The Jubilate Deo shares the same melodic materials as the Te Deum, Benedictus, Magnificat and Nunc Dimittis, and is written in Stanford's lyrical, forthright and tuneful manner.

Philip Moore was the Organist-Choirmaster at York Minster from 1983-2008, where he led a distinguished program of choral music. A prolific composer, he wrote a great body of choral works for the choir there. The Benedictus is a serene and mystical setting, alternating verses set to plainchant (Tonus Peregrinus) with fauxbourdons in four-part harmonies. The organ accompanies with spare chordal harmonies.

David Hurd (b. 1950), one of our most illustrious composers and organists, is the Director of Music & Organist at St. Mary the Virgin, New York City. He was most notably on the Faculty of New York's General Seminary for 28 years. He is represented prominently in our 1982 Hymnal, with several hymn and service music settings. Indeed, we sing his new plainsong Gloria, Sanctus and Agnus Dei here regularly. He is a brilliant organist, having studied at Oberlin College and the Juilliard School of Music. His more than 100 choral and organ compositions are sung and played internationally and regularly recorded, and he is in demand for commissions of new works. His lovely setting of verses from Psalm 92 begins and ends with chant-like music framing lyrical passages for four-part choir.

The Prelude & Fugue in C is one of **J.S. Bach's** most remarkable works. The Prelude, in a dance-like 9/8 meter, is built on the C major scale, similar to the opening phrases of Bach's Epiphany Cantata No. 65: Sie werden alle aus Saba kommen *(All they from Sheba shall come)*

THE CHIAPAS PROJECT The Chiapas Project, a lay-led part of the Diocese of Chicago's Companionship with the Diocese of Southwest Mexico, is an ongoing collaborative effort between four parishes: St. Chrysostom's, Atonement, Our Savior, and Holy Comforter. Our link is with two churches in Chiapas, at San Cristobal (San Benito) and a mission church in the Mayan Highlands at Yochib (San Mateo). Our major projects now include funding a biweekly food pantry for 45 families facing food insecurity in San Cristobal, scholarships for the children, and a weekly healthcare worker who visits Yochib each Saturday.
