



THE FIRST LESSON

Acts 3:12-19

The Lector says A Reading from the Acts of the Apostles.

Peter addressed the people, "You Israelites, why do you wonder at this, or why do you stare at us, as though by our own power or piety we had made him walk? The God of Abraham, the God of Isaac, and the God of Jacob, the God of our ancestors has glorified his servant Jesus, whom you handed over and rejected in the presence of Pilate, though he had decided to release him. But you rejected the Holy and Righteous One and asked to have a murderer given to you, and you killed the Author of life, whom God raised from the dead. To this we are witnesses. And by faith in his name, his name itself has made this man strong, whom you see and know; and the faith that is through Jesus has given him this perfect health in the presence of all of you.

"And now, friends, I know that you acted in ignorance, as did also your rulers. In this way God fulfilled what he had foretold through all the prophets, that his Messiah would suffer. Repent therefore, and turn to God so that your sins may be wiped out."


THE EPISTLE 1 John 3:1-7

Beloved, we are God's children now; what we will be has not yet been revealed. What we do know is this: when he is revealed, we will be like him, for we will see him as he is. And all who have this hope in him purify themselves, just as he is pure.

Gospeller The Holy Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to Luke.

People Glory to you, Lord Christ.

Jesus himself stood among the disciples and said to them, "Peace be with you." They were startled and terrified, and thought that they were seeing a ghost. He said to them, "Why are you frightened, and why do doubts arise in your hearts? Look at my hands and my feet; see that it is I myself. Touch me and see; for a ghost does not have flesh and bones as you see that I have." And when he had said this, he showed them his hands and his feet. While in their joy they were disbelieving and still wondering, he said to them, "Have you anything here to eat?" They gave him a piece of broiled fish, and he took it and ate in their presence.



Holy and gracious God: In your infinite love you made us for yourself; and, when we had fallen into sin and become subject to evil and death, you, in your mercy, sent Jesus Christ, your only and eternal Son, to share our human nature, to live and die as one of us, to reconcile us to you, the God and maker of all. Jesus stretched out his arms upon the cross, and offered himself, in obedience to your will, a perfect sacrifice for the whole world. On the night he was handed over to suffering and death, our Savior Jesus Christ took bread; and when he had given thanks to you, he broke it, and gave it to his disciples, and said, "Take, eat: This is my Body, which is given for you. Do this for the remembrance of me." After supper Jesus took the cup of wine; and when he had given thanks, he gave it to them, and said, "Drink this, all of you: This is my Blood of the new Covenant, which is shed for you and for many for the forgiveness of sins. 

Notes on the Service Music

Charles Marie Widor (1844-1937) was Organiste-Titulaire at St. Sulpice, Paris, and through his teaching and composing, one of the founders of modern organ playing and composition. The second movement of his final symphony for the organ, the *Symphonie Gothique*, is a lyric aria for the harmonic flute stops of the organ. A gracious melody is presented and then heard in canon.

The great Bengali poet, Rabindranth Tagore, was a polymath known also as a writer, playwright, composer, philosopher, social reformer and painter. He was the first non-European writer to win the Nobel Prize for Literature. His writings were viewed as spiritual, elegant and filled with lyric naturalism and contemplation. His beautiful poem is set to soaring and exultant music by the Latvian composer Eriks Esenvalds. Esenvalds is one of our current and most commissioned composers, writing music of great serenity and grace, in transparent yet harmonically rich textures. Tagore's exquisite poem finds its perfect partner in Esenvalds' sublime music.

Herbert Sumsion (1899-1995) was one of the last English organists, conductors and composers with direct links to the Elgar era. He was appointed Organist and Master of the Choristers at Gloucester Cathedral in 1928 where he was especially noted for his brilliant leadership of the Three Choirs Festival. He was a prolific composer in an unmistakable English style. His text setting is gracious, heard through lyrical melodies. *O salutaris Hostia* was written for the Choir of Leeds Parish Church.

Eugène Gigout (1844-1925) was, for 62 years, Organist-Titulaire of the church of St. Augustin in Paris, one of those marvelous edifices built as part of Baron Hausmann's reorganization of Paris in the mid-1800's. He was also well-known as a teacher at the Paris Conservatory, teaching organ and improvisation. Many of his students were some of the most respected Parisian organists through the 1960's. He was a prolific composer, his most well-known work being the the Toccata in b minor. It is written in typical French toccata style: rapid figurations over a melody heard in the pedals and ending with dramatic chords on full organ.

For nearly 15 years St. Chrysostom's has sent missionaries to our companion diocese in Southeastern Mexico. Together with three other Chicago churches, Atonement, Church of Our Savior, and Holy Comforter, the lay-led Chiapas Project has served the people of two parishes in San Cristobal de las Casas and Yochib with a food pantry, scholarships for over 40 students, and weekly visits from a healthcare worker. So close is the relationship between St. Chrysostom's and these Chiapas parishes that a community building where classes, Sunday school, and church meetings take place was named in honor of our former rector, Rev. Ray Webster.
