Jesus said, "I am the good shepherd. The good shepherd lays down his life for the sheep. The hired hand, who is not the shepherd and does not own the sheep, sees the wolf coming and leaves the sheep and runs away—and the wolf snatches them and scatters them. The hired hand runs away because a hired hand does not care for the sheep. I am the good shepherd. I know my own and my own know me, just as the Father knows me and I know the Father. THE NICENE CREED



By his death he has destroyed death, and by his rising to life again he has won for us everlasting life. Therefore we praise you, joining our voices with Angels and Archangels and with all the company of heaven, who for ever sing this hymn to proclaim the glory of your Name:

Holy and gracious God: In your infinite love you made us for yourself; and, when we had fallen into sin and become subject to evil and death, you, in your mercy, sent Jesus Christ, your only and eternal Son, to share our human nature, to live and die as one of us, to reconcile us to you, the God and maker of all. Jesus stretched out his arms upon the cross, and offered himself, in obedience to your will, a perfect sacrifice for the whole world. On the night he was handed over to suffering and death, our Savior Jesus Christ took bread; and when he had given thanks to you, he broke it, and gave it to his disciples, and said, "Take, eat: This is my Body, which is given for you. Do this for the remembrance of me." After supper Jesus took the cup of wine; and when he had given thanks, he gave it to them, and said, "Drink this, all of you: This is my Blood of the new Covenant, which is shed for you and for many for the forgiveness of sins. Whenever you drink it, do this for the remembrance of me."

Therefore we proclaim the mystery of faith:

People Christ has died. Christ is risen. Christ will come again.

We celebrate the memorial of our redemption, Almighty God, in this sacrifice of praise and thanksgiving. Recalling Christ's death, resurrection, and ascension, we offer you these gifts. Sanctify them by your Holy Spirit to be for your people the Body and Blood of your Son, the holy food and drink of new and unending life in Christ. Sanctify us also that we may faithfully receive this holy Sacrament, and serve you in unity, constancy, and peace; and at the last day bring us with all your saints into the joy of your eternal kingdom. All this we ask through Jesus Christ our Savior. By Christ, and with Christ, and in Christ, in the unity of the Holy Spirit all honor and glory is yours, Almighty God, now and for ever. **AMEN**.







Notes on Today's Service Music

Naji Hakim (b. 1955) is a well-respected French-Lebanese organist and composer who has an active career as a concert artist, composer, and professor. Until his retirement he served as Professor of Musical Analysis at the Conservatoire National de Région de Boulogne-Billancourt, and visiting professor of organ, improvisation, analysis, and composition at the Royal Academy of Music, London. He was Organiste-Titulaire at Sacre Coeur, Paris, and then succeeded Olivier Messiaen as Organiste-Titulaire of La Trinité, Paris. His Variations on O FILII ET FILIAE begin with the theme presented on the Cornet over a light and fluid accompaniment of flutes; we then hear a variation in compound meter played on the foundations and reeds, followed by a rather jaunty presentation of the theme in major, and the work concludes with a floridly-decorated variation of the theme punctuated by full, drawn-out statements of the word "Alleluia".

Patrick Hadley (1899-1973) was Fellow at Gonville and Caius College, Cambridge, and appointed to the University's Chair in Music. *My beloved Spake* continues the grand early 20th century style of Anglican music that evolved from Charles Stanford through Ralph Vaughan Williams, Hubert Parry, Edward Bairstow and many others. Note how orchestral the organ accompaniment is, how the voices are heard in contrast to each other, and how he revolves all twelves tones of the musical scale in the short space of two measures at "The fig tree putteth forth".

Eric Whitacre is one of our most fascinating contemporary composers, writing in a lush and mystical style. His music is marked by complexly layered textures, shimmering harmonies, and unusual vocal effects. *Oculi omnium* makes ethereal use of treble voice, layering complex harmonies under a solo voice. The work ends with glorious Amen which divides the choir into a 12-voice texture. The text of the anthem is the 'Sydney Grace', recited at high table and all other campus ceremonies at Sydney Sussex College, Cambridge.

Louis Vierne was Organiste-Titulaire of Nôtre-Dame, Paris, from the early years of last century until 1937. A student of both César Franck and Charles Marie Widor he expanded the French symphonic organ tradition with six symphonies and other works for organ, all highly imaginative in their use of the instrument and in harmonic development. *Cathédrales*, one of the *24 Pièces des Fantaisies*, is a majestic architectural study, highlighting Vierne's famous chromaticism.

ADULT FORUM FOR SUNDAY, MAY 5: THE CHIAPAS PROJECT

For nearly 15 years St. Chrysostom's has sent missionaries to our companion diocese in Southeastern Mexico. Together with three other Chicago churches, Atonement, Church of Our Savior, and Holy Comforter, the lay-led Chiapas Project has served the people of two parishes in San Cristobal de las Casas and Yochib with a food pantry, scholarships for over 40 students, and weekly visits from a healthcare worker. So close is the relationship between St. Chrysostom's and these Chiapas parishes that a community building where classes, Sunday school, and church meetings take place was named in honor of our former rector, Rev. Ray Webster.




