





THE FIRST LESSON

Acts 8:26-40

The Lector says A Reading from the Acts of the Apostles.

An angel of the Lord said to Philip, "Get up and go toward the south to the road that goes down from Jerusalem to Gaza." (This is a wilderness road.) So he got up and went. Now there was an Ethiopian eunuch, a court official of the Candace, queen of the Ethiopians, in charge of her entire treasury. He had come to Jerusalem to worship and was returning home; seated in his chariot, he was reading the prophet Isaiah. Then the Spirit said to Philip, "Go over to this chariot and join it." So Philip ran up to it and heard him reading the prophet Isaiah. He asked, "Do you understand what you are reading?" He replied, "How can I, unless someone guides me?" And he invited Philip to get in and sit beside him. Now the passage of the scripture that he was reading was this:

"Like a sheep he was led to the slaughter, and like a lamb silent before its shearer, so he does not open his mouth. In his humiliation justice was denied him. Who can describe his generation? For his life is taken away from the earth."

The eunuch asked Philip, "About whom, may I ask you, does the prophet say this, about himself or about someone else?" Then Philip began to speak, and starting with this scripture, he proclaimed to him the good news about Jesus. As they were going along the road, they came to some water; and the eunuch said, "Look, here is water! What is to prevent me from being baptized?" He commanded the chariot to stop, and both of them, Philip and the eunuch, went down into the water, and Philip baptized him. When they came up out of the water, the Spirit of the Lord snatched Philip away; the eunuch saw him no more, and went on his way rejoicing. But Philip found himself at Azotus, and as he was passing through the region, he proclaimed the good news to all the towns until he came to Caesarea.

The Lector says A Reading from the First Letter of John.


Beloved, let us love one another, because love is from God; everyone who loves is born of God and knows God. Whoever does not love does not know God, for God is love. God's love was revealed among us in this way: God sent his only Son into the world so that we might live through him. In this is love, not that we loved God but that he loved us and sent his Son to be the atoning sacrifice for our sins. Beloved, since God loved us so much, we also ought to love one another. No one has ever seen God; if we love one another, God lives in us, and his love is perfected in us.

By this we know that we abide in him and he in us, because he has given us of his Spirit. And we have seen and do testify that the Father has sent his Son as the Savior of the world. God abides in those who confess that Jesus is the Son of God, and they abide in God. So we have known and believe the love that God has for us.

God is love, and those who abide in love abide in God, and God abides in them. Love has been perfected among us in this: that we may have boldness on the day of judgment, because as he is, so are we in this world. There is no fear in love, but perfect love casts out fear; for fear has to do with punishment, and whoever fears has not reached perfection in love. We love because he first loved us. Those who say, "I love God," and hate their brothers or sisters, are liars; for those who do not love a brother or sister whom they have seen, cannot love God whom they have not seen. The commandment we have from him is this: those who love God must love their brothers and sisters also.



Holy and gracious God: In your infinite love you made us for yourself; and, when we had fallen into sin and become subject to evil and death, you, in your mercy, sent Jesus Christ, your only and eternal Son, to share our human nature, to live and die as one of us, to reconcile us to you, the God and maker of all. Jesus stretched out his arms upon the cross, and offered himself, in obedience to your will, a perfect sacrifice for the whole world. On the night he was handed over to suffering and death, our Savior Jesus Christ took bread; and when he had given thanks to you, he broke it, and gave it to his disciples, and said, "Take, eat: This is my Body, which is given for you. Do this for the remembrance of me." After supper Jesus took the cup of wine; and when he had given thanks, he gave it to them, and said, "Drink this, all of you: This is my Blood of the new Covenant, which is shed for you and for many for the forgiveness of sins. Whenever you drink it, do this for the remembrance of me."

Therefore we proclaim the mystery of faith:

Christ has died.

People Christ is risen.

Christ will come again.

We celebrate the memorial of our redemption, Almighty God, in this sacrifice of praise and thanksgiving. Recalling Christ's death, resurrection, and ascension, we offer you these gifts. Sanctify them by your Holy Spirit to be for your people the Body and Blood of your Son, the holy food and drink of new and unending life in Christ. Sanctify us also that we may faithfully receive this holy Sacrament, and serve you in unity, constancy, and peace; and at the last day bring us with all your saints into the joy of your eternal kingdom. All this we ask through Jesus Christ our Savior. By Christ, and with Christ, and in Christ, in the unity of the Holy Spirit all honor and glory is yours, Almighty God, now and for ever. **AMEN**.



Notes on this week's Service Music

- J. S. Bach's *Cantata No. 29: Wir danken dir, Gott*, a wedding cantata, opens with a festive *Sinfonia* which, in the full orchestral score, prominently features a vigorous organ part accompanied by the strings and trumpet. This has, naturally, encouraged organists to transcribe the *Sinfonia*, creating the joyous work which we hear as the Prelude this morning.
- G. F. Handel's *Utrecht Jubilate Deo* is a multi-movement work written to celebrate the Peace of Utrecht (1713). Handel sets each verse for soloist and/or chorus, with each movement musically portraying the text. The opening movement is for Alto solo and chorus. Luke Lemmeier, Countertenor, is the soloist.

William Harris (1883-1973) was Organist and Master of the Choristers at St. George's Chapel, Windsor from 1933-1961. Of his many choral works, he is remembered most for two: *Bring us, O Lord God* and *Faire is the Heaven*. Both works are for double choir, employing some of the most elegant text-setting and tone-painting one can hear. He also wrote many choral works which were more intimate in scale, employing the same stylistic traits of his larger settings. *Come down, O Love divine*, sets Bianco de Sienna's (d. 1434) profound text in lines of elegant lyricism.

Louis Vierne, Organiste Titulaire of Notre Dame, Paris until 1937, was a student of César Franck, Charles Marie Widor (co-student with Charles Tournemire), and Alexandre Guilmant as well as a composer and brilliant teacher. He expanded the French symphonic organ tradition he inherited from them with six symphonies and many other works for organ, all highly imaginative in their use of the instrument and in harmonic development. The *Symphonie No. 3* contains some of his most brilliant writing. The Final is a brilliant toccata in the French style: rapid figurations over a strong pedal melody build to an ecstatic resolution.

For nearly 15 years St. Chrysostom's has sent missionaries to our companion diocese in Southeastern Mexico. Together with three other Chicago churches, Atonement, Church of Our Savior, and Holy Comforter, the lay-led Chiapas Project has served the people of two parishes in San Cristobal de las Casas and Yochib with a food pantry, scholarships for over 40 students, and weekly visits from a healthcare worker. So close is the relationship between St. Chrysostom's and these Chiapas parishes that a community building where classes, Sunday school, and church meetings take place was named in honor of our former rector, Rev. Ray Webster.
