



THE FIRST LESSON

The Lector says A reading from the Book of the Prophet Isaiah.

Surely he has borne our infirmities and carried our diseases; yet we accounted him stricken, struck down by God, and afflicted. But he was wounded for our transgressions, crushed for our iniquities; upon him was the punishment that made us whole, and by his bruises we are healed. All we like sheep have gone astray; we have all turned to our own way, and the Lord has laid on him the iniquity of us all.

He was oppressed, and he was afflicted, yet he did not open his mouth; like a lamb that is led to the slaughter, and like a sheep that before its shearers is silent, so he did not open his mouth. By a perversion of justice he was taken away. Who could have imagined his future? For he was cut off from the land of the living, stricken for the transgression of my people. They made his grave with the wicked and his tomb with the rich, although he had done no violence, and there was no deceit in his mouth.

Yet it was the will of the Lord to crush him with pain. When you make his life an offering for sin, he shall see his offspring, and shall prolong his days; through him the will of the Lord shall prosper. Out of his anguish he shall see light; he shall find satisfaction through his knowledge. The righteous one, my servant, shall make many righteous, and he shall bear their iniquities. Therefore I will allot him a portion with the great, and he shall divide the spoil with the strong; because he poured out himself to death, and was numbered with the transgressors; yet he bore the sin of many, and made intercession for the transgressors.

THE EPISTLE

The Lector says A reading from the letter of Paul to the Hebrews.

Every high priest chosen from among mortals is put in charge of things pertaining to God on their behalf, to offer gifts and sacrifices for sins. He is able to deal gently with the ignorant and wayward, since he himself is subject to weakness; and because of this he must offer sacrifice for his own sins as well as for those of the people. And one does not presume to take this honor, but takes it only when called by God, just as Aaron was.

So also Christ did not glorify himself in becoming a high priest, but was appointed by the one who said to him,

"You are my Son, today I have begotten you"; as he says also in another place,

"You are a priest forever,

according to the order of Melchizedek."

In the days of his flesh, Jesus offered up prayers and supplications, with loud cries and tears, to the one who was able to save him from death, and he was heard because of his reverent submission. Although he was a Son, he learned obedience through what he suffered; and having been made perfect, he became the source of eternal salvation for all who obey him, having been designated by God a high priest according to the order of Melchizedek.



THE NICENE CREED





In the fullness of time, put all things in subjection under your Christ, and bring us to that heavenly country where, with the blessed Virgin Mary, blessed Paul the Apostle, blessed Francis of Assisi, and all your saints, we may enter the everlasting heritage of your sons and daughters; through Jesus Christ our Savior, the firstborn of all creation, the head of the Church, and the author of our salvation.

By Christ, and with Christ, and in Christ, in the unity of the Holy Spirit all honor and glory is yours, Almighty God, now and for ever. **AMEN**.





Notes on Today's Service Music

Although seldom heard in today's concert halls, **John Ireland** (1879 – 1962) was in fact one of the most widely performed British composers during his lifetime. Born at Bowden, Cheshire, into a cultured family of Scottish descent, Ireland began piano studies at the Royal College of Music in London (RCM) in 1893 and later continued his study in composition with fellow peers Ralph Vaughan Williams and Gustav Holst. Although his main compositional instruction derived from Sir Charles Villiers Stanford, his music also shows the strong influence of Parry and others of the English Romantic school. The Elegy is the second movement of a work originally scored for wind band, and transcribed for a number of different ensembles and instruments, including by the composer himself.

Malcom Boyle (1902-1976), born in Windsor, was a chorister at Eton College, studying organ with Sir Walter Parratt of St. George's Chapel, and after taking his BMus at Queen's College (Oxford) became Assistant to Sir Walford Davies at St. George's. He was organist of Chester Cathedral from 1932-1949 when he left to become Examiner for the Associated Board of the Royal Schools of Music. His marvelous anthem was not published during his lifetime, existing only in a manuscript written down from memory by George Guest, Organist & Director of Music at St. John's College, Cambridge. Dr. Guest had been a chorister for Boyle at Chester Cathedral. The anthem, in the grand manner of his 20th century Anglican inheirited from Parry and Stanford, opens with a festive organ prelude. The text is proclaimed in dramatic and tuneful music. The middle third of the work is a quiet and lyrical melody for trebles. This is followed by a return to the grandeur of the opening.

William Harris (1883-1973) was Organist and Master of the Choristers at St. George's Chapel, Windsor from 1933-1961. Of his many choral works, he is remembered most for two: *Bring us, O Lord God* and *Faire is the Heaven*. Both works are for double choir, employing some of the most elegant text-setting and tone-painting one can hear. He also wrote many choral works which were more intimate in scale, employing the same stylistic traits of his larger settings. *Come down, O Love divine* sets Bianco de Sienna's (d. 1434) profound text in lines of elegant lyricism.

Louis Vierne was Organiste Titulaire of Nôtre-Dame, Paris, from the early years of the 20th century until 1937. A student of both César Franck and Charles Marie Widor he expanded the French symphonic organ tradition with six symphonies and many other works for organ, all highly imaginative in their use of the instrument and in harmonic development. The *Toccata in b flat minor*, one of the *24 Pièces des Fantaisies*, is a fierce and relentlessly powerful work employing melodic material equally between the manuals and pedal. There is a striking use of diminished seventh chords, a sense of the whirlwind, and finishes senza ritard (without slowing).



Burse (n.) A case of two squares of stiff material, hinged or bound together at one end, which contains the corporal and purificators for use at the celebration of the eucharist. The burse is covered in the liturgical color of the day, and placed on top of the veil which covers the chalice.


