

THE PRESENTATION AND EXAMINATION OF THE CANDIDATES

The Celebrant says The candidates for Holy Baptism will now be presented.

Each Candidate is presented individually by their parents and/or sponsors

Sponsors I present N. to receive the Sacrament of Baptism.

The Celebrant asks the parents and/or sponsors

Will you be responsible for seeing that the person you present is brought up in the Christian faith and life? *We will, with God's help.*

Will you by your prayers and witness help this person to grow into the full stature of Christ? *We will, with God's help.*

Then the Celebrant asks the following questions of the candidates who can speak for themselves, and of the parents and sponsors who speak on behalf of the infants and younger children

Do you renounce Satan and all the spiritual forces of wickedness that rebel against God? *I renounce them*.

Do you renounce the evil powers of this world which corrupt and destroy the creatures of God? *I renounce them*.

Do you renounce all sinful desires that draw you from the love of God? *I renounce them.*

Do you turn to Jesus Christ and accept him as your savior? I do.

Do you put your whole trust in his grace and love? I do.

Do you promise to follow and obey him as your Lord? I do.

The Celebrant addresses the congregation, saying

Will you who witness these vows do all in your power to support these children in their life in Christ?

People We will.

Celebrant Let us join with them as they are committed Christ and renew our own baptismal covenant.

THE BAPTISMAL COVENANT

Celebrant People	Do you believe in God the Father? I believe in God the Father Almighty, creator of heaven and earth.
Celebrant People	Do you believe in Jesus Christ, the Son of God? I believe in Jesus Christ, his only Son, our Lord. He was conceived by the power of the Holy Spirit and born of the Virgin Mary. He suffered under Pontius Pilate, was crucified, died, and was buried. He descended to the dead. On the third day he rose again. He ascended into heaven, and is seated at the right hand of the Father. He will come again to judge the living and the dead.
Celebrant People	Do you believe in God the Holy Spirit? I believe in the Holy Spirit, the holy catholic Church, the communion of saints, the forgiveness of sins, the resurrection of the body, and the life everlasting.
Celebrant	Will you continue in the apostles' teaching and fellowship, in the breaking of bread, and in the prayers?
People	I will, with God's help.
Celebrant People	Will you persevere in resisting evil, and, whenever you fall into sin, repent and return to the Lord? I will, with God's help.

Celebrant	Will you proclaim by word and example the Good News of God in Christ?
People	I will, with God's help.
Celebrant	Will you seek and serve Christ in all persons, loving your neighbor as yourself?
People	I will, with God's help.
Celebrant People	Will you strive for justice and peace among all people, and respect the dignity of every human being? I will, with God's help.

PRAYERS FOR THE CANDIDATE

The Celebrant then says to the People

Let us now pray for these children who are to receive the Sacrament of new birth.

The Celebrant concludes Grant, O Lord, that all who are baptized into the death of Jesus Christ your Son may live in the power of his resurrection and look for him to come again in glory; who lives and reigns now and for ever. **Amen.**

THANKSGIVING OVER THE WATER

Celebrant	The Lord be with you.

Celebrant	Let us give thanks to the Lord our God.

The Celebrant continues We thank you, Almighty God, for the gift of water. Over it the Holy Spirit moved in the beginning of creation. Through it you led the children of Israel out of their bondage in Egypt into the land of promise. In it your Son Jesus received the baptism of John and was anointed by the Holy Spirit as the Messiah, the Christ, to lead us, through his death and resurrection, from the bondage of sin into everlasting life.

We thank you, Father, for the water of Baptism. In it we are buried with Christ in his death. By it we share in his resurrection. Through it we are reborn by the Holy Spirit. Therefore in joyful obedience to your Son, we bring into his fellowship those who come to him in faith, baptizing them in the Name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit.

At the following words, the Celebrant touches the water:

Now sanctify this water, we pray you, by the power of your Holy Spirit, that those who here are cleansed from sin and born again may continue for ever in the risen life of Jesus Christ our Savior. To him, to you, and to the Holy Spirit, be all honor and glory, now and for ever. **Amen.**

THE BAPTISMS

The Candidate is presented by name to the Celebrant, or to an assisting priest or deacon, who then pours water upon the Candidate, saying

N., I baptize you in the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit. **Amen.**

Then the Priest places a hand on the Candidate's head, marking on the forehead the sign of the cross,and sayingN., you are sealed by the Holy Spirit in Baptism and marked as
Christ's own for ever.

When this has been done, the Priest prays over them, saying

Let us pray. Heavenly Father, we thank you that by water and the Holy Spirit you have bestowed upon these your servants the forgiveness of sin, and have raised them to the new life of grace. Sustain them, O Lord, in your Holy Spirit. Give them inquiring and discerning hearts, the courage to will and to persevere, a spirit to know and to love you, and the gift of joy and wonder in all your works. **Amen.**

When the Baptisms are finished, the Celebrant says

Let us welcome the newly baptized.

People We receive you into the household of God. Confess the faith of Christ crucified, proclaim his resurrection, and share with us in his eternal priesthood.



CARILLONNEUR

Jim Fackenthal

Marcel Dupré (1886-1971) was Organiste Titulaire of St-Sulpice, Paris, an acclaimed organ virtuoso, and the teacher of many of last century's most important organists and teachers. His *Toccata* on the hymn for the First Vespers of All Saint's Day places the plainchant melody in the pedal under brilliant figurations. The text of this hymn speaks of the "blessed hosts, Prophets and Apostles, martyrs and confessors" and ends with the *Gloria Patri*.

The English composer **Edgar Bainton** (1880-1956) was a student of H. Walford Davies and Charles Stanford, and contemporary of George Dyson and William Harris. He was a professor at the Conservatory in Newcastle-upon-Tyne, well-known as a conductor, and in 1933 he became the Director of the New South Wales Conservatorium of Music. He conducted several major orchestral premieres in Australia, including Elgar, Bax, Delius, Sibelius and Walton. His most famous and beloved choral anthem, *And I saw a new heaven*, is a marvelously beautiful and serene work, set in the grand Anglican style of the early-mid 20th century. The All Saints text, our Second Lesson for the morning, is lovingly portrayed in long lyric lines, accompanied by an orchestral organ part.

Charles Villiers Stanford (1852-1924), born in Dublin, taught at Cambridge University and was Organist-Choirmaster of Trinity College. *Justorum animae* is one of three motets written for the Trinity Chapel choir, the other two being *Beati quorum via* and *Coelus ascendit hodie*. The motet alternates moments of serenity (the opening: "The souls of the righteous are in the hands of God") and great drama (and there shall no turmoil touch them"). These motets are sung *a capella*, unusual for Stanford who generally wrote orchestral organ accompaniments.

Charles Tournemire (1870-1939) was one of Franck's last organ students at the Conservatoire National de Paris and succeeded him as Organiste Titulaire of Ste-Clothilde. His organ studies continued with Charles Maire Widor, Franck's successor at the Conservatory. His deep knowledge of the plainchant Propers sung during the Sunday Mass and on festal occasions fired an enormous out-pouring of composed and improvised organ music. He was highly respected for the intensity and brilliance of those compositions and improvisations and his influence upon the succeeding generation of French composers was immense. His *Improvisation sûr le 'Te Deum'* is one of five improvisations recorded in two sessions at Ste-Clothilde which his pupil, Maurice Duruflé later transcribed from the wax cylinders. The work is based on the opening notes of the solemn plainchant melody. A brilliant and imaginative work, it shows Tournemire's sheer genius in its remarkable unfolding. It is especially appropriate this All Saints Sunday as the *Te Deum* text speaks of all the Apostles, prophets, saints, martyrs, and of us, the servants of the Lord.

The descant to Hymn 287 is by Richard Hoskins.

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WHAT'S HAPPENING AT ST. CHRYSOSTOM'S

ALL SAINTS' DAY In the Christian tradition, we tend to be more comfortable talking about the dead than our secular friends. We are an Easter people, and so, while our grief is always real, we also take comfort in the knowledge that those we love but see no longer rest in the providential grace of God. All Saints' Day—which we observe on Sunday, though it properly falls on November 1-is a day on which the church has typically commemorated the lives of the big saints—Joan of Arc, St. Luke the Evangelist, St. Teresa of Avila—and then the church has reserved November 2, All Souls' Day, to remember those loved ones whom we grieve. In the Episcopal church, we usually combine these two days into one, and on All Saints' we remember all the dead—the famous and the not so famous. You'll notice that there is a small altar set up in the Brooker Chapal at the north side of the nave. There are slips of paper to write the name of our beloved dead and candles to light to remember their lives. You're welcome to make use of that space as a time of prayer and of remembrance for the dead.

Fill their bag with crayons, coloring sheets, books, and more. There are some new toys in the pray ground and watch for suggestion notes to connect with what is happening in the service!


