


Malachi 3:1-4







Notes on Today's Service Music

Ernst Pepping (1901-1981) is considered the most important 20th century composer of the German Protestant Church. Along with his vast catalogue of compositions of church music, orchestral music, and chamber music he taught at the Spandauer Kirkenmusikschule as well as at the Berliner Hochschule as Professor of church music and composition. Pepping composed three volumes of organ music based on chorales appropriate for the church year. These organ works are written in a bright and rhythmic style which explores interesting and surprising harmonies. We hear two settings of an Advent chorale.

Orlando Gibbons (1583-1625) is acknowledged, with Byrd and Tallis, as one of the preeminent composers of the glorious Tudor era. He was a chorister at King's College Chapel and in about 1603 became a Gentleman of the Chapel Royal. *This is the Record of John* is set in the verse anthem style, another of the developments of the post-reformation period. The work alternates instrumental interludes with music sung by a soloist and then contrasting music sung by full choir. Luke Lemmeier, Countertenor, is the soloist.

Very little is known about the brilliant Tudor composer, **Robert Ramsey**. At most we can only place him in Cambridge during a brief period when he took his Doctoral degree and then composed for the various college chapels. His writing is individual, sonorous and full of inventive harmonies. *O Sapientia* is set for five voices, using the text which we now sing.

WORD OF THE WEEK One of the things that makes Episcopalians distinctive is that we have words for just about everything! For the next several weeks, the Rector will run a series where we introduce one of the words that are used regularly in either Episcopal worship or governance with a short definition. (All definitions are taken from www.episcopalchurch.org)

Cantor (n.) A singer who sets the pitch and leads the liturgical singing of psalms, canticles, anthems, and other sung texts. Cantors often lead unaccompanied singing. In responsorial recitation of the Psalter, the cantor sings the verses of the psalm and the congregation sings a refrain after each verse or group of verses. This was the traditional way of singing the Venite in the Daily Office, and it was also a traditional way of chanting the psalms between the lessons at the Holy Eucharist (BCP, p. 582).
