



THE FIRST LESSON

Isaiah 43:1-7

Because you are precious in my sight, and honored, and I love you, I give people in return for you, nations in exchange for your life. 





Notes on Today's Service Music

Johann Sebastian Bach's monumental *Clavierübung, Dritter Teil, (Keyboard Practice, Third Part)* contains large and small works written in the form of a Lutheran organ mass: a Prelude and Fugue frame chorales which correspond to the various parts of the service, Kyrie, Gloria, Creed, etc., as sung in 18th century Lutheran liturgical practice. Each of these works portray in their counterpoint, text-painting, and gesture, Bach's most profound theological thinking, combining as a whole to form a veritable Prayer Book. One of the large choral settings, *Christ, unser Herr zum Jordan kam* (When Jesus went to Jordan's stream) was sung as a reminder of our baptism. Bach sets the chorale melody (Hymn 139) in the pedal, heard in long notes. A two-voice florid accompaniment is heard in the manuals over the chorale tune and represents the flowing waters of the River Jordan. The left hand plays continuous 16th notes under sparkling right-hand figurations.

Hans Leo von Hassler (1564-1612), son of Isaac Hassler (town musician of Nuremburg) and a celebrated organist and composer, was the first German composer to go to Italy and study with the famous Andrea Gabrieli in Venice. Upon his return he was Music Director in Augsburg, then appointed to the court of the Elector of Saxony. His glorious setting of John1:14 shows the direct influence of his Venetian teacher in its alternation of high and low choirs and its over-all homophonic chordal structure. The text is set in declamatory fanfare-like passages and in shorter, more complex rhythmic sections. The work was first printed in Nuremberg in 1597. Hassler's *Missa super Dixit Maria* is based on his motet *Dixit Maria*, drawing various melodic fragments from the motet's beautiful setting.

In dir ist Freude is the largest setting of the chorales included in Bach's Orgelbüchlein, a collection of chorale preludes for the church year. The phrases of the chorale tune are heard as the opening notes of the counterpoint (Vorimatation) and the pedal part is virtuosic. Bach keeps us intrigued as to what the entire chorale melody is as he only lets us hear the first four notes of this joyous, dance-like work. Eventually the entire melody is lined out in the Soprano voice. This charming carol is associated with the coming of the Saviour and the beginning of the new year.

Christology (n.) The work of Christ concerns the action of God in the Incarnation in "reconciling the world to himself" (2 Cor 5:19). Since the sixteenth century, many Protestant and some Anglican theologians have focused their discussion of Christ's work in the "three offices" of prophet, priest, and king. From the Greek Christos, "Christ," and logia, "doctrine." In Christian theology the word refers to the doctrine of Christ. It can be used in a broad sense to designate the whole body of teaching about Jesus the Christ, including both his person and his work. The traditional scope of Christology, however, is narrower. It covers only an exposition of the person of Christ, usually in terms of the Chalcedonian Definition, a carefully balanced formula designed to express both the full humanity of Jesus of Nazareth and his full divinity as the Son of God.
