



Now concerning spiritual gifts, brothers and sisters, I do not want you to be uninformed. You know that when you were pagans, you were enticed and led astray to idols that could not speak. Therefore I want you to understand that no one speaking by the Spirit of God ever says "Let Jesus be cursed!" and no one can say "Jesus is Lord" except by the Holy Spirit.

Now there are varieties of gifts, but the same Spirit; and there are varieties of services, but the same Lord; and there are varieties of activities, but it is the same God who activates all of them in everyone. To each is given the manifestation of the Spirit for the common good. To one is given through the Spirit the utterance of wisdom, and to another the utterance of knowledge according to the same Spirit, to another faith by the same Spirit, to another gifts of healing by the one Spirit, to another the working of miracles, to another prophecy, to another the discernment of spirits, to another various kinds of tongues, to another the interpretation of tongues. All these are activated by one and the same Spirit, who allots to each one individually just as the Spirit chooses.



THE GOSPEL John 2:1-11

Gospeller The Holy Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to John.

People Glory to you, Lord Christ.

On the third day there was a wedding in Cana of Galilee, and the mother of Jesus was there. Jesus and his disciples had also been invited to the wedding. When the wine gave out, the mother of Jesus said to him, "They have no wine." And Jesus said to her, "Woman, what concern is that to you and to me? My hour has not yet come." His mother said to the servants, "Do whatever he tells you." Now standing there were six stone water jars for the Jewish rites of purification, each holding twenty or thirty gallons. Jesus said to them, "Fill the jars with water." And they filled them up to the brim. He said to them, "Now draw some out, and take it to the chief steward." So they took it. When the steward tasted the water that had become wine, and did not know where it came from (though the servants who had drawn the water knew), the steward called the bridegroom and said to him, "Everyone serves the good wine first, and then the inferior wine after the guests have become drunk. But you have kept the good wine until now." Jesus did this, the first of his signs, in Cana of Galilee, and revealed his glory; and his disciples believed in him.







Notes on Today's Service Music

Louis Vierne compiled a collection of 24 organ works entitled *Pièces des Fantaisies*, intended as evocations of particular places and ideas, for example: *Cathédrales, Sur le Rhin, Claire de Lune, Naïades, Fantômes*, and the famous *Carillon de Westminster*. The *Impromptu*, from the Third Suite, is a brilliant scherzo, playful and charming.

Johann Eccard (1553-1611) was Kapellmeister to the Elector in Berlin. Previously, he had studied with Orlando di Lasso in Augsburg where he was the director of Count Fugger's orchestra. His writing shows the direct influence of Di Lasso and the Gabriellis. *O Freude über Freud!* is a joyous setting for eight voices, contrasting high and low voices in antiphonal phrases.

The legendary history of music and composers at the Basilica San Marco in Venice is a brilliant and glorious legacy. Among its most famous Organists we find Adrian Willaert, Francesco Cavalli, Claudio Merullo, and, of course, Claudio Monteverdi. The architecture of the Basilica with its famous twin choir galleries inspired Willaert and his successors to write music for antiphonal choirs, exploiting the vast acoustic which made the singing of polyphony difficult. Andrea Gabrieli and his nephew Giovanni both brought this style to its peak of development. This Venetian style, specifically the Gabrieli's, was a powerful influence on composers who developed it into the high art of the Baroque, especially Heinrich Schütz and J. S. Bach. **Andrea Gabrieli** (c1538-6-1612), was likely a student of Willaert, then went to Munich to study with di Lasso, and became Organist of San Marco in 1566. He is considered as one of the founders of the Venetian school of composition with his nephew Giovanni, Monteverdi and Cavalli His music is infused with an intensity derived from a sonority created by a simplification of texture, text highlighting, harmony and sudden changes for expressive purposes. The beautifully solemn *O sacrum convivium* is set for five voices in ravishing harmonies, ending with an expressive Alleluia.

Olivier Messiaen (Died 1992) was Organiste Titulaire at La Trinité, Paris and is remembered as the most important French composer of the 20th century. Not only did he create a new compositional language for the organ, wrote phenomenal works for orchestra, piano and chamber groups, he also influenced many composers through his teaching at the Paris Conservatory. Messiaen's La Nativité du Seigneur, a collection of nine meditations on the birth of Christ, was one of his first important contributions to the organ repertoire. Each meditation portrays various aspects of the miraculous birth such as the Virgin and Child, the shepherds, the Wise Men, as well as theological meditations on the life of Jesus, salvation, and the continuing presence of God on earth. Dieu parmi nons (God among us) is the final work, combining many of the musical themes heard throughout the nine meditations: the opening Incarnation theme represents God coming to earth in the form of Jesus (The Word) and is heard in the pedal, the second theme is Divine Love heard on the Célestes, and the third theme is Mary's exultant Magnificat. These themes are developed in variations and then combined in a glorious toccata.






Clerestory, or Clearstory (n.) The upper part of a church building with windows for interior lighting. It rises above and "clears" the rest of the building.
