THE FIRST LESSON

Isaiah 6:1-8

The Lector says A reading from the Book of the Prophet Isaiah.

In the year that King Uzziah died, I saw the Lord sitting on a throne, high and lofty; and the hem of his robe filled the temple. Seraphs were in attendance above him; each had six wings: with two they covered their faces, and with two they covered their feet, and with two they flew. And one called to another and said:

"Holy, holy, holy is the Lord of hosts; the whole earth is full of his glory."

The pivots on the thresholds shook at the voices of those who called, and the house filled with smoke. And I said: "Woe is me! I am lost, for I am a man of unclean lips, and I live among a people of unclean lips; yet my eyes have seen the King, the Lord of hosts!"

Then one of the seraphs flew to me, holding a live coal that had been taken from the altar with a pair of tongs. The seraph touched my mouth with it and said: "Now that this has touched your lips, your guilt has departed and your sin is blotted out." Then I heard the voice of the Lord saying, "Whom shall I send, and who will go for us?" And I said, "Here am I; send me!"

The Lector says A reading from the first letter of Paul to the Corinthians.

I would remind you, brothers and sisters, of the good news that I proclaimed to you, which you in turn received, in which also you stand, through which also you are being saved, if you hold firmly to the message that I proclaimed to you--unless you have come to believe in vain.

For I handed on to you as of first importance what I in turn had received: that Christ died for our sins in accordance with the scriptures, and that he was buried, and that he was raised on the third day in accordance with the scriptures, and that he appeared to Cephas, then to the twelve. Then he appeared to more than five hundred brothers and sisters at one time, most of whom are still alive, though some have died. Then he appeared to James, then to all the apostles. Last of all, as to one untimely born, he appeared also to me. For I am the least of the apostles, unfit to be called an apostle, because I persecuted the church of God. But by the grace of God I am what I am, and his grace toward me has not been in vain. On the contrary, I worked harder than any of them--though it was not I, but the grace of God that is with me. Whether then it was I or they, so we proclaim and so you have come to believe.

Once while Jesus was standing beside the lake of Gennesaret, and the crowd was pressing in on him to hear the word of God, he saw two boats there at the shore of the lake; the fishermen had gone out of them and were washing their nets. He got into one of the boats, the one belonging to Simon, and asked him to put out a little way from the shore. Then he sat down and taught the crowds from the boat. When he had finished speaking, he said to Simon, "Put out into the deep water and let down your nets for a catch." Simon answered, "Master, we have worked all night long but have caught nothing. Yet if you say so, I will let down the nets." When they had done this, they caught so many fish that their nets were beginning to break. Notes on Today's Service Music

Jehan Alain (1911-1940) was one of several outstanding French composers and organists active between World Wars I and II. At the Paris Conservatoire he studied organ with Marcel Dupré, and composition with Paul Dukas and Jean Roger-Ducasse. The combined influences of Charles Tournemire (Organist at St. Clotilde), his discovery of Eastern music, and the revelation of playing an 18th century organ, resulted in a colorful compositional turn from the 19th century French Symphonic Tradition. His works are marked by complex rhythms, exotic colorations and intense harmonies. The Choral Dorien is a serene and quiet work, written in the Dorian Mode, with a simple theme. The theme progresses through several modulations, ending with a coda restating the opening phrase.

Lucy Walker is quickly becoming known as a rising and award-winning composer, pianist and music educator. She is also the Artist-in-Residence for St. Martin's Voices, based at St. Martin-in-the-Fields, London. Since completing her postgraduate studies at Gonville & Caius College, Cambridge, in 2021, she has received commission from the BBC Singers and Northern Chords. Her choral works are known for their beauty and sensitive attention to texts. Her setting of two verses from Psalm 57 contrast high and low voices in lyrical writing and beautiful harmonies.

Edward Cuthbert Bairstow (1874-1946) is regarded as one of Anglican music's great men. Organist-Choirmaster at York Minster, he left a great body of choral and organ music written in a gracious, Edwardian style and influenced by the enormous acoustic at York Minster. His harmonic language is rich and his text settings are dramatic. His short motet, *Jesu, the very Thought of Thee*, is for four voices, elegant in its writing and profound in its simplicity.

Louis Vierne was Organiste Titulaire of Notre Dame, Paris, until 1937 when he died at the console of the great Cavaillé-Coll organ during a concert. A student of both César Franck and Charles Marie Widor (co-student with Charles Tournemire) he expanded the French symphonic organ tradition with six symphonies and many other works for organ, all highly imaginative in their use of the instrument and in harmonic development. His *Second Symphony* is considered one of his masterworks: five brilliant movements tied together by thematic material imaginatively developed. The opening *Allegro risoluto* is in e minor with a dark and powerful theme, showing the chromaticism which was to dominate his later writing.

The descant to Hymn 7 is by Richard Hoskins.






Join us to explore form and color, two of the elements of design in arranging flowers. You will create your own arrangement to take home. This activity is suitable for children aged 9 and older.




WORD OF THE WEEK One of the things that makes Episcopalians distinctive is that we have words for just about everything! For the next several weeks, the Rector will run a series where we introduce one of the words that are used regularly in either Episcopal worship or governance with a short definition. (All definitions are taken from www.episcopalchurch.org)

Compline (n.) The last of the four services in the Daily Office (BCP, p. 127). It is descended from the night prayers said before bed at the end of the monastic round of daily prayer. Compline is a simple office including a confession of sins, one or more psalms, a short reading from scripture, versicles and responses, the Lord's Prayer, collects which ask for God's protection during the night to come, and the canticle Nunc dimittis. A hymn for the evening may follow the short reading from scripture. The collects may be followed by a time of silence, along with free intercessions and thanksgivings.
