✤ CHORAL MORNING PRAYER, RITE II

Morning Prayer, a form of worship that comes to us from the Book of Common Prayer, comes from the monastic tradition of praying the Daily Office at morning, noon, evening, and night. It's unusual to find Morning Prayer as the principal Sunday service of an Episcopal church, but at one time, it was the 'usual' service of most parishes, with Eucharist celebrated far less frequently. You'll notice that this service is centered on readings, Psalms, canticles (songs), and corporate intercessions. St. Chrysostom's is among the last keepers of the Morning Prayer tradition, which we offer once per month.

For the sake of your Son Jesus Christ, have mercy on us and forgive us; that we may delight in your will and walk in your ways, to the glory of your Name. Amen.







THE FIRST LESSON

The Lector says

A reading from the Book of Exodus.

Moses was keeping the flock of his father-in-law Jethro, the priest of Midian; he led his flock beyond the wilderness, and came to Horeb, the mountain of God. There the angel of the Lord appeared to him in a flame of fire out of a bush; he looked, and the bush was blazing, yet it was not consumed. Then Moses said, "I must turn aside and look at this great sight, and see why the bush is not burned up." When the Lord saw that he had turned aside to see, God called to him out of the bush, "Moses, Moses!" And he said, "Here I am." Then he said, "Come no closer! Remove the sandals from your feet, for the place on which you are standing is holy ground." He said further, "I am the God of your father, the God of Abraham, the God of Isaac, and the God of Jacob." And Moses hid his face, for he was afraid to look at God.

Then the Lord said, "I have observed the misery of my people who are in Egypt; I have heard their cry on account of their taskmasters. Indeed, I know their sufferings, and I have come down to deliver them from the Egyptians, and to bring them up out of that land to a good and broad land, a land flowing with milk and honey, to the country of the Canaanites, the Hittites, the Amorites, the Perizzites, the Hivites, and the Jebusites. THE SECOND LESSON






The Ministers and Choir process from the Sanctuary during the Hymn

Notes on Today's Service Music

Johann Sebastian Bach's monumental *Clavieriibung*, *Dritter Teil*, *(Keyboard Practice, Third Part)* contains large and small works written in the form of a Lutheran organ mass: a Prelude and Fugue frame chorales which correspond to the various parts of the service, *Kyrie, Gloria, Creed*, etc., as sung in 18th century Lutheran liturgical practice. Each of these works portray in their counterpoint, text-painting, and gesture, Bach's most profound theological thinking, combining, as a whole, to form a veritable Prayer Book. The three *Kyries* which follow the opening *Prelude* are wonderful examples of Bach's counterpoint as well as an illustration of his interest in numerology, in this instance the number three, representing the Trinity. *Christe, aller Welt Trost (Christe, the comfort of the world)* sets the chorale tune in long notes in the tenor voice, the right hand and pedal accompaniment containing elements of the chorale melody is heard in long notes in the pedal, under a monumental four-voice fugue based on the opening notes of each chorale phrase.

Philip Moore (b. 1943) was Organist-Choirmaster at York Minster from 1983-2008, where he led a distinguished program of choral music. A prolific composer, he wrote a great body of choral works for the choir there. The *Benedictus* is a serene and mystical setting, alternating verses set to plainchant *(Tonus Peregrinus)* with *fauxbourdons* in four-part harmonies. The organ accompanies with spare chordal harmonies.

Johannes Brahms continually wrote choral music during his long and productive life for various voice groupings and for specific choirs. *Ich aber bin elend* is one of several motets written for double choir. The text, from Psalm 69:30 and Exodus 34:6-7, is a plea directly from the soul for mercy and forgiveness. Brahms highlights the text by using the dark key of e minor in chromatic textures for the opening words (I am afflicted and in great sorrow), then moving to the brighter, more hopeful key of G major as he recounts the loving-kindness and mercy of the Lord. Note how masterfully he uses both choirs, constantly moving text antiphonally, creating a beautiful flow of shifting harmonies.

WORD OF THE WEEK One of the things that makes Episcopalians distinctive is that we have words for just about everything! For the next several weeks, the Rector will run a series where we introduce one of the words that are used regularly in either Episcopal worship or governance with a short definition. (All definitions are taken from www.episcopalchurch.org)

Dalmatic (n.) The distinctive vestment of deacons in the western church. It may be worn at any liturgy in any season. The term is derived from a white tunic worn in second-century Dalmatia. The dalmatic was an ample white tunic with wide sleeves, bands about the cuffs, and clavi, or colored bands, descending from the shoulders to the hem. Historically, it was worn over an alb by both bishops and deacons by the fourth century, but it did not become a vestment until around the ninth century. The dalmatic was accepted as the vestment worn by the deacon at the eucharist by the ninth century. Eventually deacons adopted the eastern orarion or stole, worn on top and hanging straight down from the left shoulder. The dalmatic has varied widely in appearance, and this variety continues in the Episcopal Church today. Deacons often wear the stole on top, placed over the left shoulder and tied under the right arm or hanging straight down.

ST. 
