

THE FIRST LESSON

Joshua 5:9-12

The Lector says A reading from the Book of Joshua.

The Lord said to Joshua, "Today I have rolled away from you the disgrace of Egypt." And so that place is called Gilgal to this day.

While the Israelites were camped in Gilgal they kept the passover in the evening on the fourteenth day of the month in the plains of Jericho. On the day after the passover, on that very day, they ate the produce of the land, unleavened cakes and parched grain. The manna ceased on the day they ate the produce of the land, and the Israelites no longer had manna; they ate the crops of the land of Canaan that year.

If anyone is in Christ, there is a new creation: everything old has passed away; see, everything has become new! All this is from God, who reconciled us to himself through Christ, and has given us the ministry of reconciliation; that is, in Christ God was reconciling the world to himself, not counting their trespasses against them, and entrusting the message of reconciliation to us. So we are ambassadors for Christ, since God is making his appeal through us; we entreat you on behalf of Christ, be reconciled to God. For our sake he made him to be sin who knew no sin, so that in him we might become the righteousness of God.

THE GOSPEL Luke 15:1-3, 11b-32

Gospeller The Holy Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to Luke.

All the tax collectors and sinners were coming near to listen to Jesus. And the Pharisees and the scribes were grumbling and saying, "This fellow welcomes sinners and eats with them." So Jesus told them this parable:

"There was a man who had two sons. The younger of them said to his father, 'Father, give me the share of the property that will belong to me.' So he divided his property between them. A few days later the younger son gathered all he had and traveled to a distant country, and there he squandered his property in dissolute living. When he had spent everything, a severe famine took place throughout that country, and he began to be in need. So he went and hired himself out to one of the citizens of that country, who sent

him to his fields to feed the pigs. He would gladly have filled himself with the pods that the pigs were eating; and no one gave him anything. But when he came to himself he said, 'How many of my father's hired hands have bread enough and to spare, but here I am dying of hunger! I will get up and go to my father, and I will say to him, "Father, I have sinned against heaven and before you; I am no longer worthy to be called your son; treat me like one of your hired hands." So he set off and went to his father. But while he was still far off, his father saw him and was filled with compassion; he ran and put his arms around him and kissed him. Then the son said to him, 'Father, I have sinned against heaven and before you; I am no longer worthy to be called your son.' But the father said to his slaves, 'Quickly, bring out a robe--the best one--and put it on him; put a ring on his finger and sandals on his feet. And get the fatted calf and kill it, and let us eat and celebrate; for this son of mine was dead and is alive again; he was lost and is found!' And they began to celebrate.

"Now his elder son was in the field; and when he came and approached the house, he heard music and dancing. He called one of the slaves and asked what was going on. He replied, 'Your brother has come, and your father has killed the fatted calf, because he has got him back safe and sound.' Then he became angry and refused to go in. His father came out and began to plead with him. But he answered his father, 'Listen! For all these years I have been working like a slave for you, and I have never disobeyed your command; yet you have never given me even a young goat so that I might celebrate with my friends. But when this son of yours came back, who has devoured your property with prostitutes, you killed the fatted calf for him!' Then the father said to him, 'Son, you are always with me, and all that is mine is yours. But we had to celebrate and rejoice, because this brother of yours was dead and has come to life; he was lost and has been found."'



We give thanks to you, O God, for the goodness and love which you have made known to us in creation; in the calling of Israel to be your people; in your Word spoken through the prophets; and above all in Jesus Christ, the Word made flesh. For in these last days you sent Jesus to be incarnate from the Virgin Mary, to be the Savior and Redeemer of the world. In Christ, you have delivered us from evil, and made us worthy to stand before you. In Christ, you have brought us out of error into truth, out of sin into righteousness, out of death into life.

On the night before he died for us, our Savior Jesus Christ took bread; and when he had given thanks to you, he broke it, and gave it to his disciples, and said, "Take, eat: This is my Body, which is given for you. Do this for the remembrance of me." After supper Jesus took the cup of wine; and when he had given thanks, he gave it to them, and said, "Drink this, all of you: This is my Blood of the new Covenant, which is shed for you and for many for the forgiveness of sins. 

Notes on Today's Service Music

Maurice Duruflé (1902-1986) was Organiste-Titulaire at St-Etienne-du-Mont, Paris, and Professor of Harmony at the Paris Conservatory. His organ studies were with Charles Tournemire, Louis Vierne, Eugène Gigout, and Alexandre Guilmant, and he studied composition with Paul Dukas. His most well-known work is his exquisite *Requiem* and he composed orchestral, organ and choral works.

The legendary history of music and composers at the Basilica San Marco in Venice is a brilliant and glorious legacy. Among its most famous Organists we find Adrian Willaert, Francesco Cavalli, Claudio Merullo, Giovanni and Andrea Gabrieli, and, of course, Claudio Monteverdi. The architecture of the Basilica with its famous twin choir galleries inspired Willaert and his successors to write music for antiphonal choirs, exploiting the vast acoustic which made the singing of polyphony difficult. By using passages of music which remained in one tonal area, the music 'sang' in the Basilica in a much clearer manner. These composers, all innovative geniuses, established an entirely new style of composition for the church: an expressive setting which gave text prominence over counterpoint, using harmony and rhythm to illumine the text. Andrea Gabrieli (c. 1538-6-1612), one of the founders of the Venetian school, infuses his music with an intensity derived from a sonority created by a simplification of texture, text highlighting, harmony and sudden changes for expressive purposes. We hear the First and Third parts of his setting of this morning's Psalm.

John Sheppard was appointed *Informator choristarum* at Magdalen College, Oxford, in 1543 and his name appears in the lists of the Gentlemen of the Chapel Royal in the 1550's. He was present at the coronation of Elizabeth I in 1559 and is thought to have died the following year. He was a prolific composer of the highest stature, working during the culmination of Latin polyphony. His music is individual, highly complex, using dissonance and, quite often, an amazing 3-octave range for the voices. *In manus tuas* is an introspective and serene work, originally scored for alto, tenor and bass. This text is sung at Compline, the anthem for the last of the daily monastic services.

One of his greatest works, Bach's *Fantasie in g minor*, is a dark drama played out in jagged, spiky figures and tortured harmonic progressions. Freely written cadenza-like sections alternate with rigidly controlled passages of great chromatic intensity, culminating in a decisive resolution. This is Bach at his monumental best, showing us his resolute and muscular soul.

WORD OF THE WEEK One of the things that makes Episcopalians distinctive is that we have words for just about everything! For the next several weeks, the Rector will run a series where we introduce one of the words that are used regularly in either Episcopal worship or governance with a short definition. (All definitions are taken from www.episcopalchurch.org)

Deacon (n.) Deacons are members of one of three distinct orders of ordained ministry (with bishops and presbyters). In the Episcopal Church a deacon exercises "a special ministry of servanthood" directly under the deacon's bishop, serving all people and especially those in need (BCP, p. 543). This definition reflects the practice of the early church, in which deacons were ordained "not to the priesthood but to the servanthood [diakonia, "ministry"] of the bishop" (Hippolytus, Apostolic Tradition). In the ancient Greek-speaking world the term diakonos meant an intermediary who acted or spoke for a superior. Christian deacons were agents of the bishop, often with oversight of charity. Since ancient times the liturgical functions of deacons have suggested the activity of angels. As they proclaim the gospel, lead intercessions, wait at the eucharistic table, and direct the order of the assembly, deacons act as sacred messengers, agents, and attendants. The revival of the order of deacons in the twentieth century has emphasized social care and service. Many bishops in the Episcopal Church expect their deacons to promote care of the needy outside the church. In addition to those ordained deacon as a permanent vocation, there are also "transitional deacons" who are ordained deacon as a preliminary step toward ordination as a priest.

CHRYS'S KITCHEN MINISTRY Every Wednesday morning between 7:30 and 9:00am our fellow parishioners and Friends of St. Chrys' drop off bagged lunches containing two sandwiches, fruit and a snack in the narthex. We add a bottle of water and deliver to our neighbors in Chicago's Englewood neighborhood and LaSalle Street Church's Breaking Bread Ministries. For many who receive the lunches it will be the only meal of the day. We want to thank parishioner Lizzy Miller and her fellow students at Latin School of Chicago who provided over 100 lunches last Wednesday, and also the parents of St. Chrysostom's Day School for their continuing support of our efforts. As part of this Ministry, each third Tuesday of the month, Liz Kohlbeck and her crew serve a hot home-made evening meal to our neighbors in need on our campus at 1424 N. Dearborn. 
