





THE FIRST LESSON Acts 9:36-43

The Lector says A reading from the Acts of the Apostles.

Now in Joppa there was a disciple whose name was Tabitha, which in Greek is Dorcas. She was devoted to good works and acts of charity. At that time she became ill and died. When they had washed her, they laid her in a room upstairs. Since Lydda was near Joppa, the disciples, who heard that Peter was there, sent two men to him with the request, "Please come to us without delay." So Peter got up and went with them; and when he arrived, they took him to the room upstairs. All the widows stood beside him, weeping and showing tunics and other clothing that Dorcas had made while she was with them. Peter put all of them outside, and then he knelt down and prayed. He turned to the body and said, "Tabitha, get up." Then she opened her eyes, and seeing Peter, she sat up. He gave her his hand and helped her up. Then calling the saints and widows, he showed her to be alive. This became known throughout Joppa, and many believed in the Lord. Meanwhile he stayed in Joppa for some time with a certain Simon, a tanner.

"Salvation belongs to our God who is seated on the throne, and to the Lamb!"

And all the angels stood around the throne and around the elders and the four living creatures, and they fell on their faces before the throne and worshiped God, singing,

"Amen! Blessing and glory and wisdom and thanksgiving and honor and power and might be to our God forever and ever! Amen."

Then one of the elders addressed me, saying, "Who are these, robed in white, and where have they come from?" I said to him, "Sir, you are the one that knows." Then he said to me, "These are they who have come out of the great ordeal; they have washed their robes and made them white in the blood of the Lamb.

For this reason they are before the throne of God, and worship him day and night within his temple, and the one who is seated on the throne will shelter them. They will hunger no more, and thirst no more; the sun will not strike them, nor any scorching heat; for the Lamb at the center of the throne will be their shepherd, and he will guide them to springs of the water of life, and God will wipe away every tear from their eyes."



We acclaim you, holy Lord, glorious in power. Your mighty works reveal your wisdom and love. You formed us in your own image, giving the whole world into our care, so that, in obedience to you, our Creator, we might rule and serve all your creatures. When our disobedience took us far from you, you did not abandon us to the power of death. In your mercy you came to our help, so that in seeking you we might find you. Again and again you called us into covenant with you, and through the prophets you taught us to hope for salvation.

Father, you loved the world so much that in the fullness of time you sent your only Son to be our Savior. Incarnate by the Holy Spirit, born of the Virgin Mary, he lived as one of us, yet without sin. To the poor he proclaimed the good news of salvation; to prisoners, freedom; to the sorrowful, joy. To fulfill your purpose he gave himself up to death; and, rising from the grave destroyed death, and made the whole creation new.

And, that we might live no longer for ourselves, but for him who died and rose for us, he sent the Holy Spirit, his own first gift for those who believe, to complete his work in the world, and to bring to fulfillment the sanctification of all.

When the hour had come for him to be glorified by you, his heavenly Father, having loved his own who were in the world, he loved them to the end; at supper with them he took bread, and when he had given thanks to you, he broke it, and gave it to his disciples, and said, "Take, eat: This is my Body, which is given for you. Recalling Christ's death and his descent among the dead, proclaiming his resurrection and ascension to your right hand, awaiting his coming in glory; and offering to you, from the gifts you have given us, this bread and this cup, we praise you and we bless you.

We praise you, we bless you, we give thanks to you, and we pray to you, Lord our God.

Lord, we pray that in your goodness and mercy your Holy Spirit may descend upon us, and upon these gifts, sanctifying them and showing them to be holy gifts for your holy people, the bread of life and the cup of salvation, the Body and Blood of your Son Jesus Christ.







### Notes on Today's Service Music

Joseph Jongen (1873-1953) performed regularly as a solo pianist and organist of great distinction but was foremost a composer, leaving a legacy of 400 compositions for keyboards, voice, chamber groups, and orchestras.

Haydn's joyous chorus extolling the wonder of creation is the final movement of the first half of his great oratorio *Die Schöpfung (The Creation)*. He brilliantly captures the spirit of the text in rousing music for chorus and soloists. Erica Schuller, Jonathan Weyant and Gabriel Reitmeier are the soloists.

Giovanni Pierluigi da Palestrina (1524-1594), one of the greatest composers for the church and certainly the leading composer of the Roman school, was Maestro of the Capella Giulia, of St. John Lateran, Sta. Maria Maggiore and served several of the most notable popes of the church. His music, of the purest renaissance style and is marked by lyricism and grace. *Ego sum panis vivus*, written for four voices, presents this beautiful text in music of flowing and lyric melodic lines.

Jean Langlais (1907-1988) was Organiste-Titulaire at Ste-Clothilde, Paris, and an influential composer and teacher. His organ and choral music is infused with the spirit of Plainchant and continues the tradition of his teacher and predecessor at Ste-Clothilde, Charles Tournemire. *Incantation pour un Jour Saint (Incantation for a Holy Day)* is a bold and fiery work, employing motifs from the chant *Lumen Christe (The Light of Christ)* which is sung at the Easter Vigil.

2025 'FIFTY DAYS OF EASTER' CAMPAIGN This week, our 50 Days of Easter Campaign will be highlighting Deborah's Place, which celebrated 40 years of service to Chicago's chronically homeless women in April. St.Chrysostom's has been a partner in that work for a majority of those years, principally providing meals to the two permanent residency programs at their Sedgewick St. location. We're hoping to help them with personal items like toiletries and basic t-shirts and leggings. Those items can be found on the 2025 50 Days of Easter Amazon Wish List. We also hope to provide gift cards for retail locations from Dunkin' Donuts to Jewel to Target. They will be given to residents to cover incidentals and as rewards for milestones met. If you'd rather make a cash donation, the committee can then purchase those items they are most in need of. According to DP's CEO Kathy Booton Wilson, "What we've landed on, what works the best, is Permanent Supportive Housing. That is the solution. That is the end to homelessness." With federal cuts now threatening that work, let's continue to partner with them to keep that support coming.


