

# \* CHORAL MORNING PRAYER, RITE II

Morning Prayer, a form of worship that comes to us from the Book of Common Prayer, comes from the monastic tradition of praying the Daily Office at morning, noon, evening, and night. It's unusual to find Morning Prayer as the principal Sunday service of an Episcopal church, but at one time, it was the 'usual' service of most parishes, with Eucharist celebrated far less frequently. You'll notice that this service is centered on readings, Psalms, canticles (songs), and corporate intercessions. St. Chrysostom's is among the last keepers of the Morning Prayer tradition, which we offer once per month.

### THE FIRST LESSON

1 Kings 19:1-4, 8-15a

The Lector says A reading from the first book of Kings.

Ahab told Jezebel all that Elijah had done, and how he had killed all the prophets with the sword. Then Jezebel sent a messenger to Elijah, saying, "So may the gods do to me, and more also, if I do not make your life like the life of one of them by this time tomorrow." Then he was afraid; he got up and fled for his life, and came to Beer-sheba, which belongs to Judah; he left his servant there.

But he himself went a day's journey into the wilderness, and came and sat down under a solitary broom tree. He asked that he might die: "It is enough; now, O Lord, take away my life, for I am no better than my ancestors." He got up, and ate and drank; then he went in the strength of that food forty days and forty nights to Horeb the mount of God. At that place he came to a cave, and spent the night there.

Then the word of the Lord came to him, saying, "What are you doing here, Elijah?" He answered, "I have been very zealous for the Lord, the God of hosts; for the Israelites have forsaken your covenant, thrown down your altars, and killed your prophets with the sword. I alone am left, and they are seeking my life, to take it away."


He said, "Go out and stand on the mountain before the Lord, for the Lord is about to pass by." Now there was a great wind, so strong that it was splitting mountains and breaking rocks in pieces before the Lord, but the Lord was not in the wind; and after the wind an earthquake, but the Lord was not in the earthquake; and after the earthquake a fire, but the Lord was not in the fire; and after the fire a sound of sheer silence. 

# THE SECOND LESSON

Luke 8:26-39

*The Lector says* A reading from the Gospel of Luke.

Jesus and his disciples arrived at the country of the Gerasenes, which is opposite Galilee. As he stepped out on land, a man of the city who had demons met him. For a long time he had worn no clothes, and he did not live in a house but in the tombs. When he saw Jesus, he fell down before him and shouted at the top of his voice, "What have you to do with me, Jesus, Son of the Most High God? I beg you, do not torment me" -- for Jesus had commanded the unclean spirit to come out of the man. (For many times it had seized him; he was kept under guard and bound with chains and

shackles, but he would break the bonds and be driven by the demon into the wilds.) Jesus then asked him, "What is your name?" He said, "Legion"; for many demons had entered him. They begged him not to order them to go back into the abyss.

Now there on the hillside a large herd of swine was feeding; and the demons begged Jesus to let them enter these. So he gave them permission. Then the demons came out of the man and entered the swine, and the herd rushed down the steep bank into the lake and was drowned.


When the swineherds saw what had happened, they ran off and told it in the city and in the country. Then people came out to see what had happened, and when they came to Jesus, they found the man from whom the demons had gone sitting at the feet of Jesus, clothed and in his right mind. And they were afraid. Those who had seen it told them how the one who had been possessed by demons had been healed. Then all the people of the surrounding country of the Gerasenes asked Jesus to leave them; for they were seized with great fear. So he got into the boat and returned. The man from whom the demons had gone begged that he might be with him; but Jesus sent him away, saying, "Return to your home, and declare how much God has done for you." So he went away, proclaiming throughout the city how much Jesus had done for him.



# **CARILLONNEUR**

Maurice Duruflé (1902-1986) was Organiste Titulaire at St-Etienne-du-Mont, Paris, and Professor of Harmony at the Paris Conservatory. His organ studies were with Charles Tournemire, Louis Vierne, Eugène Gigout, and Alexandre Guilmant, and he studied composition with Paul Dukas. His most well-known work is his exquisite Requiem and he composed orchestral, organ and choral works. The Variations sur le Veni Creator Spiritus' are from a larger work based on the great Pentecost hymn (504). Each variation sets the plainchant melody clearly accompanied by imaginative and beautiful harmonies. The opening variation sets the melody in chorale-like form; the second places the melody in canon between the right hand and pedal; the third is in a lively 2 against 3 metre with the melody in the soprano voice; the fourth places the melody in the pedal under a lush accompaniment; and the final variation is a glorious toccata with the plainchant again in canon between the manuals and pedals.

Johannes Brahms' (1833-1897) gloriously romantic setting of Paul Fleming's poem expresses the faith of the Christian soul in the face of adversity. The four-voice anthem is unusual in that each voice enters at the interval of a second, the same material a whole step away from the previous entrance.

**WORD OF THE WEEK** One of the things that makes Episcopalians distinctive is that we have words for just about everything! For the next several weeks, the Rector will run a series where we introduce one of the words that are used regularly in either Episcopal worship or governance with a short definition. (All definitions are taken from www.episcopalchurch.org)

**Casuistry** The study of cases or situations in light of moral goods, principles, duties, and consequences. Casuistry arises from conflicts of conscience where in a particular situation more than one course of action appears good or bad, right or wrong. Called "cases of conscience," casuistry sees moral reasoning and judgment as evolving as new circumstances lead to new choices. The critique of the abuse of casuistry, most notably by Blaise Pascal in the seventeenth century, has given casuistry a negative connotation associated with subtle distinctions and twisted logic. But casuistry has a much broader tradition, including casuistic study of the Talmud by Jewish rabbis and Islamic application of the Koran. Christian casuistry began in the late sixth century with the development of penitentials and reached its culmination in moral theology as shaped by the thought of Thomas Aguinas. Protestants rejected penitential confession, given its abuse in a system of penances and indulgences, and they also rejected the Roman Catholic casuistic tradition. However, the English Puritans and the Anglicans of the seventeenth century developed a casuistic tradition. Most notable among Anglicans are Jeremy Taylor's Ductor Dubitantium (1660) and the work of twentieth-century Anglican moralist Kenneth Kirk. A contemporary renewal of casuistry began in the development of biomedical ethics. It has continued in other areas such as business ethics and professional ethics.

FAST FOR GAZA The chain fast that began at St. Chrysostom's and St. Simon's in Arlington Hts. now includes two members of the United Church of Christ, a Mennonite, and four Episcopal priests. We fast for Gaza to remind us in both a physical and a spiritual sense of the starvation Gazans are experiencing and of our responsibilities as people of faith to end their suffering. On Wednesday, June 11, the local interfaith coalition organizing the FAST for GAZA hosted a press conference covered by the Chicago Tribune, WGN-9, and ABC-7. 



