



#### THE FIRST LESSON

2 Kings 5:1-14

The Lector says A reading from the second book of Kings.

Naaman, commander of the army of the king of Aram, was a great man and in high favor with his master, because by him the Lord had given victory to Aram. The man, though a mighty warrior, suffered from leprosy. Now the Arameans on one of their raids had taken a young girl captive from the land of Israel, and she served Naaman's wife. She said to her mistress, "If only my lord were with the prophet who is in Samaria! He would cure him of his leprosy." So Naaman went in and told his lord just what the girl from the land of Israel had said. And the king of Aram said, "Go then, and I will send along a letter to the king of Israel."

He went, taking with him ten talents of silver, six thousand shekels of gold, and ten sets of garments. He brought the letter to the king of Israel, which read, "When this letter reaches you, know that I have sent to you my servant Naaman, that you may cure him of his leprosy." When the king of Israel read the letter, he tore his clothes and said, "Am I God, to give death or life, that this man sends word to me to cure a man of his leprosy? Just look and see how he is trying to pick a quarrel with me."

But when Elisha the man of God heard that the king of Israel had torn his clothes, he sent a message to the king, "Why have you torn your clothes? Let him come to me, that he may learn that there is a prophet in Israel." So Naaman came with his horses and chariots, and halted at the entrance of Elisha's house. Elisha sent a messenger to him, saying, "Go, wash in the Jordan seven times, and your flesh shall be restored and you shall be clean." But Naaman became angry and went away, saying, "I thought that for me he would surely come out, and stand and call on the name of the Lord his God, and would wave his hand over the spot, and cure the leprosy! Are not Abana and Pharpar, the rivers of Damascus, better than all the waters of Israel? Could I not wash in them, and be clean?" He turned and went away in a rage. But his servants approached and said to him, "Father, if the prophet had commanded you to do something difficult, would you not have done it? How much more, when all he said to you was, `Wash, and be clean?" So he went down and immersed himself seven times in the Jordan, according to the word of the man of God; his flesh was restored like the flesh of a young boy, and he was clean.

# THE EPISTLE

The Lector says A reading from the letter of Paul to the Galatians.

Do not be deceived; God is not mocked, for you reap whatever you sow. If you sow to your own flesh, you will reap corruption from the flesh; but if you sow to the Spirit, you will reap eternal life from the Spirit. So let us not grow weary in doing what is right, for we will reap at harvest-time, if we do not give up. So then, whenever we have an opportunity, let us work for the good of all, and especially for those of the family of faith.

See what large letters I make when I am writing in my own hand! It is those who want to make a good showing in the flesh that try to compel you to be circumcised-- only that they may not be persecuted for the cross of Christ. Even the circumcised do not themselves obey the law, but they want you to be circumcised so that they may boast about your flesh. May I never boast of anything except the cross of our Lord Jesus Christ, by which the world has been crucified to me, and I to the world. For neither circumcision nor uncircumcision is anything; but a new creation is everything! As for those who will follow this rule-- peace be upon them, and mercy, and upon the Israel of God.

# GospellerThe Holy Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to Luke.PeopleGlory to you, Lord Christ.

The Lord appointed seventy others and sent them on ahead of him in pairs to every town and place where he himself intended to go. He said to them, "The harvest is plentiful, but the laborers are few; therefore ask the Lord of the harvest to send out laborers into his harvest. Go on your way. See, I am sending you out like lambs into the midst of wolves. Carry no purse, no bag, no sandals; and greet no one on the road. Whatever house you enter, first say, 'Peace to this house!' And if anyone is there who shares in peace, your peace will rest on that person; but if not, it will return to you. Remain in the same house, eating and drinking whatever they provide, for the laborer deserves to be paid. Do not move about from house to house. Whenever you enter a town and its people welcome you, eat what is set before you; cure the sick who are there, and say to them, 'The kingdom of God has come near to you.'

But whenever you enter a town and they do not welcome you, go out into its streets and say, `Even the dust of your town that clings to our feet, we wipe off in protest against you. Yet know this: the kingdom of God has come near.' "Whoever listens to you listens to me, and whoever rejects you rejects me, and whoever rejects me rejects the one who sent me." The seventy returned with joy, saying, "Lord, in your name even the demons submit to us!" He said to them, "I watched Satan fall from heaven like a flash of lightning. See, I have given you authority to tread on snakes and scorpions, and over all the power of the enemy; and nothing will hurt you. Nevertheless, do not rejoice at this, that the spirits submit to you, but rejoice that your names are written in heaven."



Holy and gracious God: In your infinite love you made us for yourself; and, when we had fallen into sin and become subject to evil and death, you, in your mercy, sent Jesus Christ, your only and eternal Son, to share our human nature, to live and die as one of us, to reconcile us to you, the God and maker of all. Jesus stretched out his arms upon the cross, and offered himself, in obedience to your will, a perfect sacrifice for the whole world. On the night he was handed over to suffering and death, our Savior Jesus Christ took bread; and when he had given thanks to you, he broke it, and gave it to his disciples, and said, "Take, eat: This is my Body, which is given for you. Do this for the remembrance of me." After supper Jesus took the cup of wine; and when he had given thanks, he gave it to them, and said, "Drink this, all of you: This is my Blood of the new Covenant, which is shed for you and for many for the forgiveness of sins. # ST. CHRYSOSTOM'S SINGERS

Liz Kohlbeck, Karen Meader Ann Vikstrom, Angie Yorath John Covell, Mark Hull Jeff Ammons, Jim Frederiksen, John Kapnick, Ryan Kin, Tom Whalen Calvin Hampton (1938-1984) was Organist & Choirmaster of New York's Calvary Church, a highly respected performer and a prolific composer. The *1982 Hymnal* contains several of his hymn tunes as well as a Mass setting which we sing often here. His gracious *Prelude on Materna'* presents the familiar melody in a rich and glowing setting, perfectly encapsulating his style in its three pages.

Herbert Howells (1892-1983), whose sacred choral and organ works comprise a major portion of the  $20^{\text{th}}$  century's musical heritage, was greatly influenced by the music of the 16th century, especially that of Thomas Tallis. *My Eyes for Beauty Pine* is a lovely setting of a poem by Robert Bridges. It has an unusual metric structure: the rhythm constantly shifts between three and seven beats per measure to best set the rhythm of the text.

Louis Couperin (C. 1626-1661) was a member of the Couperin musical dynasty which flourished in Paris and at Versailles during the 17<sup>th</sup> and 18<sup>th</sup> centuries. Organist of the important church of St-Gervais he also became Violist to the King. Known as a brilliant harpsichordist and organist, he was responsible for shaping French Classical music from the strict counterpoint as written by Titelouze to the colorful, concertante organ style written by Guillaume-Gabriel Nivers and Nicolas Lebègue. They and he, in turn, influenced late Baroque composers such as his nephew François Couperin (Couperin le Grand), and Nicolas de Grigny. He was also the first French composer to designate specific organ registrations.

# New Lay Minister Christian Brieva:

"The licensed Lay Minister assigned to the San Benito church, Christian Beieva, is a Chilean Anglican who has been worshiping at San Benito and who works as a practicing psychologist in San Cristobal. Christian and his wife Maria Pia have been Anglicans for the past 40 years in Chile (they met in the church, there) where Christian also served as a lay preacher. They moved to San Cristobal eight years ago to be near their daughter who lives in town with their three grandchildren. It was a friend in Canada who, Christian says, alerted him to the existence of an Anglican church in San Cristobal, and he has been attending San Benito for about a year. Deacon Charles Parker arranged for his credentialling as a Lay Minister, and he has been leading prayer services at San Benito. When we spoke with him recently, he was pleased to report attendance at Sunday prayer services has returned to levels last seen 18 months ago"





